	Anoop Swarup, a Presidential Awardee of the Republic of India (2003), brings over 32 years of distinguished service across civil governance, peacebuilding, education, and social entrepreneurship. As a futurist and humanitarian, his work spans global efforts to advance ethical leadership and nonviolent solutions to modern challenges.
	In an era marked by rapid technological and scientific progress, Dr Swarup warns that without a parallel evolution in ethical consciousness, humanity risks undermining the very foundations of civilisation.
	He champions the vision of a nonkilling society — one not only possible but rooted in four compelling truths:
	 The intrinsic human inclination toward nonviolence. Our spiritual and scientific heritage honours the sanctity of life. The development of nonkilling is a rigorous and actionable science. The demonstrated power of nonviolent social movements to confront injustice without resorting to violence.
